Upon the intimation that our late Most Gracious Sovereign King George the Sixth had died in his sleep at Sandringham in the early hours of this morning the Lords of the Privy Council assembled this day at St James's Palace, and gave orders for proclaiming her present majesty:

Whereas it hath pleased Almighty God to call to His Mercy our late Sovereign Lord King George the Sixth of Blessed and Glorious Memory by whom representatives of other members of the Commonwealth, with Principal Gentlemen of Quality, with the Lord Mayor, Alderman and Citizens of London, do now hereby with Advice and Consent of Tongue and Heart publish and proclaim that the High and Mighty Princess Elizabeth Alexandra Mary is now, by the Death of our late Sovereign of Happy Memory, become Queen Elizabeth the Second, with Faith and constant Obedience, with hearty and humble Obedience; beseeching God, by whom Kings and Queens do reign, to bless the Royal Princess Elizabeth the Second in her long and happy Years to reign over us.

Given at St. James's Palace this Sixth Day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fifty-two.

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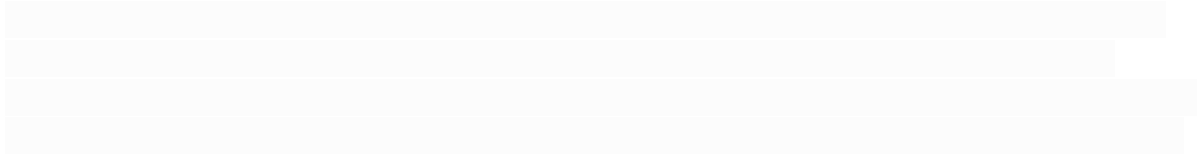
