REBUILDING CONSTITUTIONAL STANDARDS: FIVE QUESTIONS FOR THE NEXT CONSERVATIVE LEADER

8 July 2022 Meg Russell, Alan Renwick & Robert Hazell

Summary

This briefing sets out five key questions which Conservative MPs and others are encouraged to ask the party leadership candidates, based on recent public, parliamentary and expert concerns:

- 1. Will you commit to strengthening the standards system?

- 3. How will you defend the rule of law?
- 4. Will you abide by long-established constitutional norms?
- 5. Will you robustly defend our core political institutions and checks and balances?

These were echoed repeatedly in ministerial resignation statements and calls for him to go. Recent opinion polls meanwhile show strong public support for constitutional standards of integrity and accountability.

A healthy democracy depends on checks and balances, and crucially on public support for core constitutional bodies such as parliament and the courts. Candidates should be pressed on whether they will defend these principles, and insist on an end to such denigratory rhetoric.

CONCLUSION

The UK has long been a stable democracy, respected by numerous other countries around the world. That reputation has recently been badly tarnished. Meanwhile, experience in other countries such as the US has illustrated how easily constitutional norms and institutions can be weakened, and how vulnerable seemingly stable democracies can be. The Conservative Party has traditionally been a stern defender of constitutional traditions, of the importance of deference to norms and respect for the core bodies in the constitution. Recent events have brought that into question, and the current leadership contest offers an important opportunity for the party to reassert these essential values.
